# Communicable Disease Monthly Newsletter

A Monthly Epidemiology and Monitoring Report August, 2018

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### **Disease Summary**

In July, a total of 437 cases of various diseases were reported to the Florida Department of Health in Broward County (DOH-Broward). Among them, there were thirty-one cases of campylobacteriosis, twenty-eight cases of shigellosis, three cases of acute hepatitis B, ten cases of acute hepatitis C, twenty-eight cases of possible rabies exposure, one case of mumps, six cases of Varicella, and one case of vibriosis (*Vibrio vulnificus*).

The Merlin system is Florida's state repository of reportable disease case reports, including automated notification of staff about individual cases of high priority diseases. Data are extracted using event date which is usually the date of onset of illness, and when that is unknown, event date may be date of lab report, or date of diagnosis.

### **ESSENCE Syndromic Surveillance**

The Electronic Surveillance System for the Early Notification of Community Based Epidemics (ESSENCE) was developed by Johns Hopkins University and Walter Reed Army Institute of Research. It is a syndromic surveillance tool used to monitor potential bioterrorism threats and reportable diseases. Chief complaint data is transmitted daily to the ESSENCE system from participating hospital emergency rooms. DOH-Broward monitors a total of 17 reporting hospitals in Broward County. ESSENCE groups the chief compliant data into twelve syndrome groups, including: botulism-like, exposure, fever, gastrointestinal (GI), hemorrhagic, influenza-like-illness (ILI), neurological, rash, respiratory, shock/coma, injury, and other. ESSENCE creates automatic warnings or alerts for the monitoring of the twelve syndrome groups by comparing statistical differences in observed and predicted disease based on a 28-day average. Specialized queries have also been developed to monitor Florida state reportable diseases in Broward County. When an observed value is statistically higher at the p<.05 level, a yellow warning flag is generated.






Figure 1. There were two warnings and no alerts for E.R reportable disease visits; and three warnings and no alerts for E.R syndromic visits.



### Influenza Surveillance

During the month of August, Influenza and ILI activity has continued to plateau. Statewide, activity has been steady over the last few weeks. There have been no outbreaks of ILI in Broward over the last month. As seen in the chart, influenza activity peaked in week 5 for Broward County. Florida reported their state activity to have peaked in week 6. There were no positive influenza tests detected by the Bureau of Public Health Laboratories in recent weeks in Broward County. Broward influenza activity remains sporadic.

#### **Summary of Influenza and Respiratory Diseases Data**

The number of visits to the emergency department for ILI was similar to previous weeks and was around the number of expected visits at this time for the month of July with no alerts and no warnings (Fig. 2). The percent-age of emergency department visits due to ILI was staying around the same.

#### **Influenza Prevention Recommendations**

Florida Department Health in Broward County recommends that everyone take precautions to prevent the spread of influenza. The flu is a contagious disease, caused by the influenza virus, and spreads to others when infected persons cough, sneeze or talk. Common symptoms of the flu include: fever (usually high), headache, extreme tiredness, cough, sore throat, runny or stuffy nose, muscle aches, nausea, vomiting, and diarrhea (more common among children than adults). Influenza vaccines have protected millions of people safely for decades. The CDC recommends an annual flu vaccine as the first and best way to protect against influenza. With flu season almost around the corner it is very important to plan to get this vaccine. This recommendation is the same even during years when the vaccine composition (the viruses the vaccine protects against) remains unchanged from the previous season. Everyone 6 months and older is encouraged to get vaccinated against the flu even if they got vaccinated last season.

#### Other recommendations include:

Wash your hands often with soap and water or an alcohol-based hand sanitizer.

Avoid touching your eyes, nose, or mouth.

Stay home when you are sick, keep sick children home and check with a health care provider, as needed.

Do not share eating utensils, drinking glasses, towels or other personal items.

Avoid close contact with people who are sick, if possible.

## **Tuberculosis**

The Florida Department of Health in Broward County Tuberculosis Control Program provides coordinated care to persons with active TB disease, their close contacts and other persons at high risk for latent tuberculosis infection. Additionally, the TB program provides community healthcare and non-healthcare provider training and technical assistance related to TB control and prevention, and assure accurate case reporting through TB surveillance activities.

## Perinatal / Congenital Syphilis

The Perinatal Program at the Florida Department of Health in Broward County is a comprehensive linkage, re-engagement, and adherence program specialized for HIV positive pregnant women. This program provides intensive case management to HIV positive pregnant women; engage and educate healthcare providers in the prevention of perinatal transmission of HIV; and promotes HIV prevention through social marketing, community engagement and outreach activities.

Following the directive of the State Health Office, DOH-Broward's HIV Prevention Program aligns with Florida's Plan to Eliminate HIV Transmission and Reduce HIV-related Deaths: also known as the Four (4) Key Components. This Plan includes:

- 1. Implementing routine HIV and STI screening in healthcare setting and priority testing in non-healthcare settings
- 2. Provide HIV testing, rapid access to treatment and ensure retention in care; Test and Treat
- 3. Improve access to antiretroviral pre-exposure prophylaxis (PrEP) and non-occupational post-exposure prophylaxis (nPEP)
- 4. Increase HIV Awareness and community response through outreach, engagement, and messaging

Even with enhanced strategies for HIV prevention programs, meaningful community engagement and partnerships are a requisite to achieving national, state and local prevention goals. In Broward County, FL, connects gained through contracted providers, Business Responds to AIDS partners and Physicians providers provide significant partnerships and the outcomes our progress is reflected in Table 4. below.

#### **Contracted Providers**

The HIV Prevention Contracted Providers are responsible for conducting outreach, provide HIV testing, and encouraging people in their communities to know their HIV status. For clients testing reactive, the providers ensure that they are linked to medical care and have access to essential support services to help them stay in care. For individuals testing non-reactive, they provide essential support services to help individuals remain HIV-negative. Some examples of support services provided include education, counseling, behavioral interventions, support groups, condom distribution, referral and linkage services to access other essential support services that are not provided by the provider.

### **Business Responds to AIDS (BRTA)**

Business Responds to AIDS (BRTA) is a free public-private partnership initiative created by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) in 1992 that provides businesses of all sizes such as barbershops and clothing stores with tailored resources and tools to reduce stigma and prevent discrimination against employees living with HIV.

BRTA has three primary goals:

- 1.To increase community awareness about the impact of HIV/AIDS
- 2.To motivate residents to get tested and seek prevention, treatment, and care services
- 3.To increase the number of people who know their HIV status and are linked to appropriate care

#### **Physician Detailing**

The purpose of physician detailing is to increase Broward County providers' knowledge and awareness on core components that will assist in improving the health care delivery of those individuals who are at risk of HIV infection or living with HIV/AIDS. These core components are the following:

- 1, Sexual health history assessments
- 2. Routine HIV and Sexually Transmitted Disease (STD) screening in health care settings
- 3. Improve access to antiretroviral pre-exposure prophylaxis (PrEP) and non-occupational post-exposure prophylaxis (nPEP)

### **Broward County HIV Prevention Planning Council (BCHPPC)**

HIV prevention works best when there is community involvement. BCHPPC ensures that critical HIV prevention programs are informed by and succeed in reaching Broward County's diverse populations. ### **Test and Treat**

The Florida Department of Health in Broward County (DOH-Broward) and the Broward County Ryan White Part A Grantee Office are working in partnership to implement Test and Treat (T&T) throughout the Ryan White Part A system of care. T&T is a clinical program providing immediate linkage to HIV primary care and initiation of Antiretroviral Therapy (ART) at the time of HIV diagnosis or returning to care after a gap in services. The program benefits the client's health and the community by providing initial ART while working through the issues of eligibility and linkage to ongoing HIV primary care.

## Rapid-PrEP

June 1st, 2018 commenced the start of the PrEP Program at the Broward Wellness Center, known as Rapid-PrEP (R-PrEP). PrEP is the acronym for pre-exposure prophylaxis, which is a once a day medication that can prevent the acquisition of HIV. The DOH R-PrEP program will provide comprehensive HIV counseling and testing, medical and navigation services to Broward residents in addition to PrEP medication on the same day.
